At PyeongChang 2018, I relished the diversity of opportunity, I was a reporter for CBC and acted as an IPC Games Ambassador. Most recently at the Beijing 2022 Paralympic Winter Games, I was Canada's Chef de Mission and had the honour of receiving and beating a Ceremonial First Nations Drum, a signal towards reconciliation.

### Why for you are the Paralympic Games the most transformational event on earth?

The Paralympic Games bring together and celebrate humanity through sport. Now more than ever, we need to be purveyors of positivity and remind the world the power of passion and the human spirit.

#### Beyond the Games, what are your passions?

Family, nature, movement and community.

I dream of a world where all labels are dropped, and we see each other as a part of the global collective.
